

About RSCCD

The Rancho Santiago Community College District (RSCCD) is part of the California Community College system, the largest system of higher education in the United States. This system, encompassing 116 colleges organized into 73 districts, serves 1.9 million students annually.

RSCCD is one of the most established districts in California, with nearly 50 years of dedicated service. The District serves a diverse population of over 700,000 residents within a service area that includes Santa Ana, Orange, Anaheim Hills, and other major communities, representing approximately 25% of Orange County's total area.

RSCCD includes Santa Ana College (SAC) and Santiago Canyon College (SCC), supported by three auxiliary foundations that actively enhance community and campus programs.

In 2024-25, RSCCD became the number one District in California for Adult and Continuing Education Full-Time Equivalent Students (FTES). The District served 111,526 students (61,414 college credit and 50,112 continuing education).

At a Glance

Campuses: Santa Ana College (SAC) sits on 63 acres, and Santiago Canyon College (SCC) occupies 82 acres. Together, they are among the state's 116 public colleges, serving over 111,000 students in the 2024-25 academic year.

Continuing Education: In 2024-25, 50,112 students enrolled in continuing education courses focused on college preparation and career advancement, underscoring RSCCD's commitment to lifelong learning.

Bachelor's Degrees: SAC is one of the original 15 California Community Colleges authorized to offer a Bachelor's Degree and remains one of the few to provide a Bachelor of Science in Occupational Studies, Paralegal Studies, and Automotive Technology.

New Facilities: In 2024, SAC opened its \$58.8 million, 55,568-square-foot Health Sciences Building. This state-of-the-art facility houses programs such as Nursing, Medical Assisting, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Emergency Medical Technician, and Pharmacy Technology. It also includes simulation labs, study centers, classrooms, and computer labs.

University Transfers: Nearly 77% of SCC students are accepted into the University of California (UC) system, exceeding the countywide community college transfer rate of 73.7%.

Rankings: SCC is currently ranked #1 Best Community College in Orange County by Niche.com.

Career Education Leadership: As the fiscal agent of the Orange County Regional Consortium, RSCCD plays a key role in Career Education, fostering relationships with industry to connect students to high-wage occupations.

Student Achievements: During the 2024-25 academic year, the District awarded 27 Bachelor's Degrees, 4,633 Associate Degrees (A.A./A.S.), and 4,201 vocational certificates.

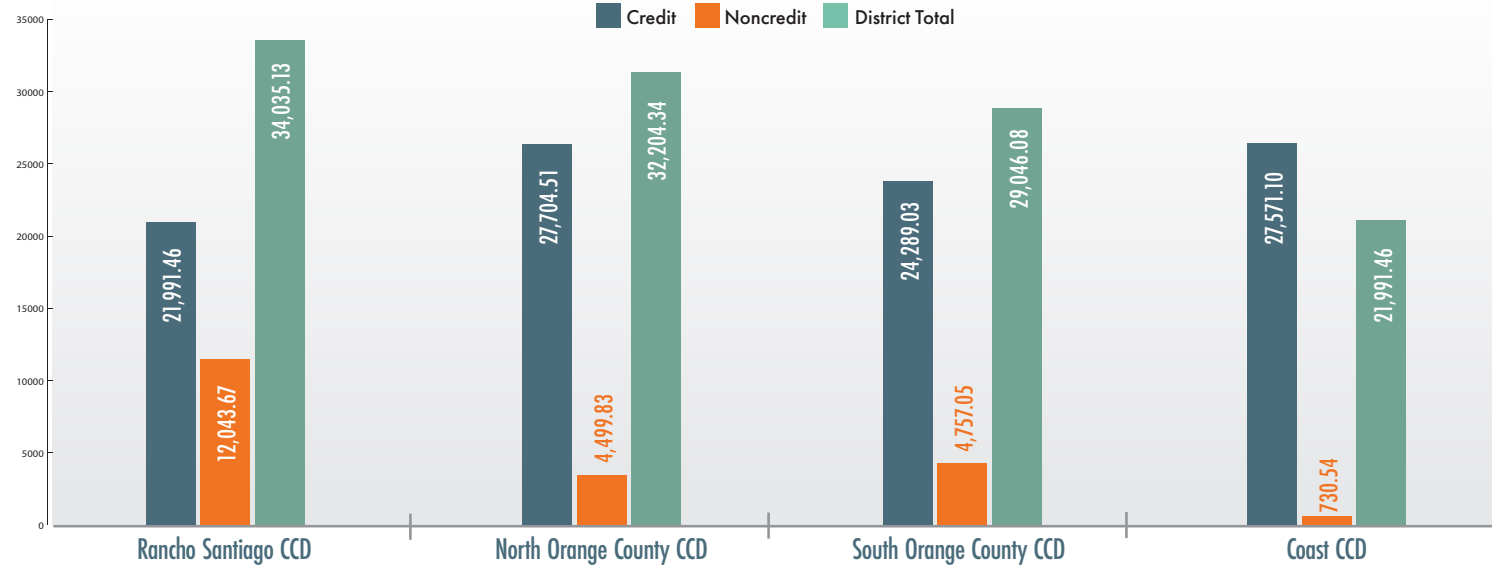

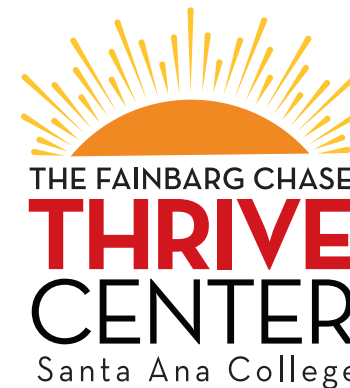

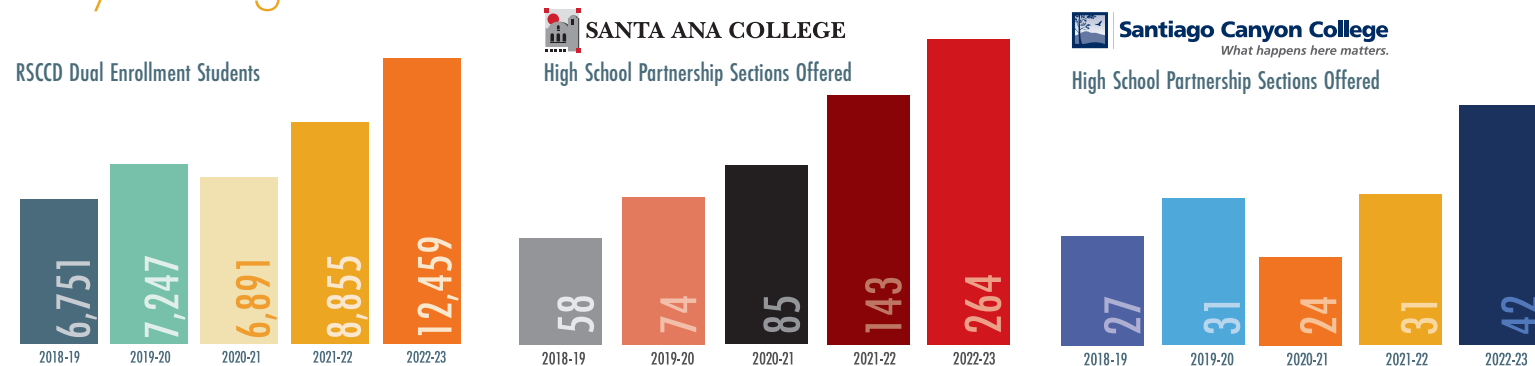
